What is a combinatorial manifold?

Loosely speaking, a combinatorial manifold is a combination of finite manifolds, such as those shown in the next figure.



2. Combinatorial Manifolds

Definition 2.1 For a given integer sequence $n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m, m \ge 1$ with $0 < n_1 < n_2 < \dots < n_s$, a combinatorial manifold \widetilde{M} is a Hausdorff space such that for any point $p \in \widetilde{M}$, there is a local chart (U_p, φ_p) of p, i.e., an open neighborhood U_p of p in \widetilde{M} and a homoeomorphism $\varphi_p : U_p \to \widetilde{B}(n_1(p), n_2(p), \dots, n_{s(p)}(p))$ with $\{n_1(p), n_2(p), \dots, n_{s(p)}(p)\} \subseteq \{n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m\}$ and $\bigcup_{\substack{p \in \widetilde{M} \\ p \in \widetilde{M}}} \{n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m\}$, denoted by $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ or \widetilde{M} on the context and

$$\widetilde{\mathcal{A}} = \{ (U_p, \varphi_p) | p \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)) \}$$

an atlas on $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$. The maximum value of s(p) and the dimension $\widehat{s}(p)$ of $\bigcap_{i=1}^{s(p)} B_i^{n_i}$ are called the dimension and the intersectional dimensional of $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ at the point p, respectively.

vertex-edge labeled graphs of combinatorial manifolds

A vertex-edge labeled graph G([1, k], [1, l]) is a connected graph G = (V, E) with two mappings

$$\tau_1: V \to \{1, 2, \cdots, k\}, \qquad \tau_2: E \to \{1, 2, \cdots, l\}$$

for integers k and l. For example, two vertex-edge labeled graphs with an underlying graph K_4 are shown in the next figure.



 $\mathcal{H}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$ — all finitely combinatorial manifolds $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$

 $\mathcal{G}[0, n_m]$ — all vertex-edge labeled graphs $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m])$ with (1) Each induced subgraph by vertices labeled with 1 in G is a union of complete graphs and vertices labeled with 0 can only be adjacent to vertices labeled with 1. (2) For each edge $e = (u, v) \in E(G), \tau_2(e) \leq \min\{\tau_1(u), \tau_1(v)\}.$

Theorem 2.1 Let $1 \leq n_1 < n_2 < \cdots < n_m, m \geq 1$ be a given integer sequence. Then every finitely combinatorial manifold $\widetilde{M} \in \mathcal{H}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$ defines a vertex-edge labeled graph $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]) \in \mathcal{G}[0, n_m]$. Conversely, every vertex-edge labeled graph $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]) \in \mathcal{G}[0, n_m]$ defines a finitely combinatorial manifold $\widetilde{M} \in$ $\mathcal{H}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$ with a 1 - 1 mapping $\theta : G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]) \to \widetilde{M}$ such that $\theta(u)$ is a $\theta(u)$ -manifold in \widetilde{M} , $\tau_1(u) = \dim \theta(u)$ and $\tau_2(v, w) = \dim(\theta(v) \cap \theta(w))$ for $\forall u \in V(G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]))$ and $\forall (v, w) \in E(G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]))$.

fundamental d-groups

Definition 2.2 For two points p, q in a finitely combinatorial manifold $M(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$, if there is a sequence B_1, B_2, \dots, B_s of d-dimensional open balls with two conditions following hold.

(1) $B_i \subset \overline{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ for any integer $i, 1 \leq i \leq s$ and $p \in B_1, q \in B_s$;

(2) The dimensional number $\dim(B_i \cap B_{i+1}) \ge d$ for $\forall i, 1 \le i \le s-1$.

Then points p, q are called d-dimensional connected in $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ and the sequence B_1, B_2, \dots, B_e a d-dimensional path connecting p and q, denoted by $P^d(p, q)$. If each pair p, q of points in the finitely combinatorial manifold $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ is d-dimensional connected, then $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ is called d-pathwise connected and say its connectivity $\geq d$. Choose a graph with vertex set being manifolds labeled by its dimension and two manifold adjacent with a label of the dimension of the intersection if there is a d-path in this combinatorial manifold. Such graph is denoted by G^d . d=1 in (a) and (b), d=2 in (c) and (d) in the next figure.



Definition 2.3 Let $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ be a finitely combinatorial manifold. For an integer $d, 1 \leq d \leq n_1$ and $\forall x \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$, a fundamental *d*-group at the point *x*, denoted by $\pi^d(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m), x)$ is defined to be a group generated by all homotopic classes of closed *d*-pathes based at *x*.

Theorem 2.2 Let $M(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ be a d-connected finitely combinatorial manifold with $1 \le d \le n_1$. Then (1) for $\forall x \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$,

$$\pi^d(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m), x) \cong (\bigoplus_{M \in V(G^d)} \pi^d(M)) \bigoplus \pi(G^d),$$

where $G^d = G^d[\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)], \ \pi^d(M), \pi(G^d)$ denote the fundamental d-groups of a manifold M and the graph G^d , respectively and (2) for $\forall x, y \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m),$ $\pi^d(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m), x) \cong \pi^d(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m), y).$

3. Differential Structures on Combinatorial Manifolds

What is a differentiable manifold?

An differential n-manifold (M^n, \mathcal{A}) is an n-manifold $M^n, M^n = \bigcup_{i \in I} U_i$, endowed with a C^r differential structure $\mathcal{A} = \{(U_\alpha, \varphi_\alpha) | \alpha \in I\}$ on M^n for an integer r with following conditions hold.

(1) $\{U_{\alpha}; \alpha \in I\}$ is an open covering of M^n ;

(2) For $\forall \alpha, \beta \in I$, atlases $(U_{\alpha}, \varphi_{\alpha})$ and $(U_{\beta}, \varphi_{\beta})$ are *equivalent*, i.e., $U_{\alpha} \cap U_{\beta} = \emptyset$ or $U_{\alpha} \cap U_{\beta} \neq \emptyset$ but the *overlap maps*

$$\varphi_{\alpha}\varphi_{\beta}^{-1}:\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\alpha}\bigcap U_{\beta})\to\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\beta}) \text{ and } \varphi_{\beta}\varphi_{\alpha}^{-1}:\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\alpha}\bigcap U_{\beta})\to\varphi_{\alpha}(U_{\alpha})$$

are C^r ;

(3) \mathcal{A} is maximal, i.e., if (U, φ) is an atlas of M^n equivalent with one atlas in \mathcal{A} , then $(U, \varphi) \in \mathcal{A}$.

A explain for condition (2).



An n-manifold is *smooth* if it is endowed with a C^{∞} differential structure.

What is a differentiable combinatorial manifold?

Definition 3.1 For a given integer sequence $1 \leq n_1 < n_2 < \cdots < n_m$, a combinatorially C^h differential manifold $(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m); \widetilde{A})$ is a finitely combinatorial manifold $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$, $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m) = \bigcup_{i \in I} U_i$, endowed with a atlas $\widetilde{A} = \{(U_{\alpha}; \varphi_{\alpha}) | \alpha \in I\}$ on $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$ for an integer $h, h \geq 1$ with conditions following hold.

(1) $\{U_{\alpha}; \alpha \in I\}$ is an open covering of $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m);$

(2) For $\forall \alpha, \beta \in I$, local charts $(U_{\alpha}; \varphi_{\alpha})$ and $(U_{\beta}; \varphi_{\beta})$ are equivalent, i.e., $U_{\alpha} \bigcap U_{\beta} = \emptyset$ or $U_{\alpha} \bigcap U_{\beta} \neq \emptyset$ but the overlap maps

$$\varphi_{\alpha}\varphi_{\beta}^{-1}:\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\alpha}\bigcap U_{\beta})\to\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\beta}) \text{ and } \varphi_{\beta}\varphi_{\alpha}^{-1}:\varphi_{\beta}(U_{\alpha}\bigcap U_{\beta})\to\varphi_{\alpha}(U_{\alpha})$$

are C^h mappings;

(3) *A* is maximal, i.e., if (U; φ) is a local chart of *M*(n₁, n₂, · · · , n_m) equivalent with one of local charts in *A*, then (U; φ) ∈ *A*.

Local properties of combinatorial manifolds

Tangent vector spaces

Definition 3.2 Let $(\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m), \widetilde{\mathcal{A}})$ be a smoothly combinatorial manifold and $p \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$. A tangent vector v at p is a mapping $v : \mathscr{X}_p \to \mathbf{R}$ with conditions following hold.

(1)
$$\forall g, h \in \mathscr{X}_p, \forall \lambda \in \mathbf{R}, v(h + \lambda h) = v(g) + \lambda v(h);$$

(2) $\forall g, h \in \mathscr{X}_p, v(gh) = v(g)h(p) + q(p)v(h).$

Theorem 3.2 For any point $p \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ with a local chart $(U_p; [\varphi_p])$, the dimension of $T_n \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ is

Definition 3.3 Let $M(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ be a smoothly combinatorial manifold and $p \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$. A tensor of type (r, s) at the point p on $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ is an (r + s)-multilinear function τ ,

$$\tau: \underbrace{T_p^* \widetilde{M} \times \cdots \times T_p^* \widetilde{M}}_r \times \underbrace{T_p \widetilde{M} \times \cdots \times T_p \widetilde{M}}_s \to \mathbf{R},$$

where $T_p \widetilde{M} = T_p \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m)$ and $T_p^* \widetilde{M} = T_p^* \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \cdots, n_m).$

Theorem 3.3 Let $\widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ be a smoothly combinatorial manifold and $p \in \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$. Then

$$T^r_s(p,\widetilde{M}) = \underbrace{T_p\widetilde{M} \otimes \cdots \otimes T_p\widetilde{M}}_r \otimes \underbrace{T^*_p\widetilde{M} \otimes \cdots \otimes T^*_p\widetilde{M}}_s,$$

where $T_p \widetilde{M} = T_p \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$ and $T_p^* \widetilde{M} = T_p^* \widetilde{M}(n_1, n_2, \dots, n_m)$, particularly, $\dim T_s^r(p, \widetilde{M}) = (\widehat{s}(p) + \sum_{i=1}^{s(p)} (n_i - \widehat{s}(p)))^{r+s}.$

curvature tensor

Definition 3.4 A connection \widetilde{D} on a smoothly combinatorial manifold \widetilde{M} is a mapping $\widetilde{D} : \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \times T^r_s \widetilde{M} \to T^r_s \widetilde{M}$ on tensors of \widetilde{M} with $\widetilde{D}_X \tau = \widetilde{D}(X, \tau)$ such that for $\forall X, Y \in \mathscr{X}\widetilde{M}, \tau, \pi \in T^r_s(\widetilde{M}), \lambda \in \mathbf{R}$ and $f \in C^{\infty}(\widetilde{M})$,

(1)
$$\widetilde{D}_{X+fY}\tau = \widetilde{D}_X\tau + f\widetilde{D}_Y\tau$$
 and $\widetilde{D}_X(\tau + \lambda\pi) = \widetilde{D}_X\tau + \lambda\widetilde{D}_X\pi;$
(2) $\widetilde{D}_X(\tau \otimes \pi) = \widetilde{D}_X\tau \otimes \pi + \sigma \otimes \widetilde{D}_X\pi;$

(3) for any contraction C on $T^r_s(\widetilde{M})$, $\widetilde{D}_X(C(\tau)) = C(\widetilde{D}_X\tau)$.

A combinatorially connection space is a 2-tuple (M, D) consisting of a smoothly combinatorial manifold \widetilde{M} with a connection \widetilde{D} and a torsion tensor $\widetilde{T} : \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \times$ $\mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \to \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$ on $(\widetilde{M}, \widetilde{D})$ is defined by $\widetilde{T}(X, Y) = \widetilde{D}_X Y - \widetilde{D}_Y X - [X, Y]$ for $\forall X, Y \in \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$. If $\widetilde{T}|_U(X, Y) \equiv 0$ in a local chart $(U, [\varphi])$, then \widetilde{D} is called torsionfree on $(U, [\varphi])$. For $\forall X, Y \in \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$, a combinatorially curvature operator $\widetilde{\mathcal{R}}(X, Y) : \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \to \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$ is defined by $\widetilde{\mathcal{R}}(X, Y) : \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \to \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$ is defined by for $\forall Z \in \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M})$. **Definition 3.5** Let \widetilde{M} be a smoothly combinatorial manifold and $g \in A^2(\widetilde{M}) = \bigcup_{p \in \widetilde{M}} T_2^0(p, \widetilde{M})$. If g is symmetrical and positive, then \widetilde{M} is called a combinatorially Riemannian manifold, denoted by (\widetilde{M}, g) . In this case, if there is a connection \widetilde{D} on (\widetilde{M}, g) with equality following hold

$$Z(g(X,Y)) = g(\widetilde{D}_Z,Y) + g(X,\widetilde{D}_ZY)$$

then \widetilde{M} is called a combinatorially Riemannian geometry, denoted by $(\widetilde{M}, g, \widetilde{D})$.

Einstein's gravitational equations in multi-spacetimes

Let $(\widetilde{M}, g, \widetilde{D})$ be a combinatorially Riemannian manifold. A type (0, 2) tensor $\mathscr{E} : \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \times \mathscr{X}(\widetilde{M}) \to C^{\infty}(\widetilde{M})$ with

$${\mathscr E}={\mathscr E}_{(\mu
u)(\kappa\lambda)}dx^{\mu
u}\otimes dx^{\kappa\lambda}$$

is called an *energy-momentum tensor* if it satisfies the conservation laws $\widetilde{D}(\mathscr{E}) = 0$, i.e., for any indexes $\kappa, \lambda, 1 \leq \kappa \leq m, 1 \leq \lambda \leq n_{\kappa}$,

$$\frac{\partial \mathscr{E}_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)}}{\partial x^{\kappa\lambda}} - \Gamma^{\sigma\varsigma}_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)} \mathscr{E}_{(\sigma\varsigma)(\kappa\lambda)} - \Gamma^{\sigma\varsigma}_{(\kappa\lambda)(\kappa\lambda)} \mathscr{E}_{(\mu\nu)(\sigma\varsigma)} = 0$$

Then we get these *Einstein's* gravitational equations in a multi-spacetime to be

$$\widetilde{\mathcal{R}}_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)} - \frac{1}{2} \mathbf{R} g_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)} + \lambda g_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)} = -8\pi G \mathscr{E}_{(\mu\nu)(\kappa\lambda)}.$$

Global properties of combinatorial manifolds

$$\mathscr{C} = \{ (\widetilde{U}_{\alpha}, [\varphi_{\alpha}]) | \alpha \in \widetilde{I} \} \longrightarrow \text{ for } \forall \alpha \in \widetilde{I}, \ \widehat{s}(p) + \sum_{i=1}^{s(p)} (n_i - \widehat{s}(p)) \text{ is an constant } n_{\widetilde{U}_{\alpha}}$$

for $\forall p \in \widetilde{U}_{\alpha}.$
$$\mathscr{H}_{\widetilde{M}} = \{ n_{\widetilde{U}} \mid \alpha \in \widetilde{I} \}.$$

Definition 3.6 Let \widetilde{M} be a smoothly combinatorial manifold with orientation \mathscr{O} and $(\widetilde{U}; [\varphi])$ a positively oriented chart with a constant $n_{\widetilde{U}}$. Suppose $\omega \in \Lambda^{n_{\widetilde{U}}}(\widetilde{M}), \widetilde{U} \subset \widetilde{M}$ has compact support $\widetilde{C} \subset \widetilde{U}$. Then define

$$\int_{\widetilde{C}} \omega = \int \varphi_*(\omega|_{\widetilde{U}}).$$

Now if $\mathscr{C}_{\widetilde{M}}$ is an atlas of positively oriented charts with an integer set $\mathscr{H}_{\widetilde{M}}$, let $\widetilde{P} = \{(\widetilde{U}_{\alpha}, \varphi_{\alpha}, g_{\alpha}) | \alpha \in \widetilde{I}\}$ be a partition of unity subordinate to $\mathscr{C}_{\widetilde{M}}$. For $\forall \omega \in \Lambda^{n}(\widetilde{M}), n \in \mathscr{H}_{\widetilde{M}}$, an integral of ω on \widetilde{P} is defined by

$$\int_{\widetilde{P}} \omega = \sum_{\alpha \in \widetilde{I}} \int g_{\alpha} \omega.$$

• A generalization of Stokes theorem

Theorem 3.4 Let \widetilde{M} be a smoothly combinatorial manifold with an integer set $\mathscr{H}_{\overline{M}}(n,m)$ and \widetilde{D} a boundary subset of \widetilde{M} . For $\forall \widetilde{n} \in \mathscr{H}_{\overline{M}}(n,m)$ if $\omega \in \Lambda^{\overline{n}}(\widetilde{M})$ has a compact support, then $\int_{\overline{D}} \widetilde{d}\omega = \int_{\partial \overline{D}} \omega$ with the convention $\int_{\partial \overline{D}} \omega = 0$ while $\partial \widetilde{D} = \emptyset$.

Theorem 3.5 Let $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m])$ be a vertex-edge labeled graph with an integer set $\mathscr{H}_G(n, m)$ and \widetilde{D} a boundary subset of $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m])$. For $\forall \widetilde{n} \in \mathscr{H}_G(n, m)$ if $\omega \in \Lambda^{\overline{n}}(G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]))$ has a compact support, then $\int_{\overline{D}} \widetilde{d\omega} = \int_{\partial \overline{D}} \omega$ with the convention $\int_{\partial \overline{D}} \omega = 0$ while $\partial \widetilde{D} = \emptyset$.

Corollary 3.1 Let $G([0, n_m], [0, n_m])$ be a vertex-edge labeled graph with an integer set $\mathscr{H}_G(n, m)$. For $\forall \tilde{n} \in \mathscr{H}_G(n, m)$ if $\omega \in \Lambda^{\overline{n}}(G([0, n_m], [0, n_m]))$ has a compact support, then

$$\int_{G([0,n_m][0,n_m])} \omega = 0$$
